Readers will know that the Adoption Contact Register for Scotland service reunites people separated by adoption and produces nearly 30 matches (or links) between registrants every year. From time the figure dips and this seems to be the case in 2010. In this Bulletin we have decided to run a detailed account of one of the links that have taken place in October so as to show the human side behind the statistics. Names etc have changed to provide confidentiality.

Anne was 22 when her son Jamie was born in 1970. He was adopted soon after. Anne registered on the Adoption Contact Register (ACR) in 1990 twenty years later and on the day of her son's birthday. On the registration form she said:

"The reason I placed Jamie for adoption was because I felt it was best for him at the time, although there was a great deal of parental pressure. It was a mistake I have regretted ever since"

Anne went on to say that she had had no other children.



Sometime earlier this year, Jamie (now Mark) downloaded an ACR registration form. He completed on October 2nd and we received it ten days later.

Anne now lives in Aberdeen and Mark lives in Canada. Our

next step will be check that Anne is still living at the same address and then we'll have a discussion with Mark as to his hopes and wishes, after which we'll be in a better position to break the news to Anne.
